Financial Planning Overview


Family should create a comprehensive financial plan that includes:

- Public benefits
- Private resources
- Special needs trust
 - Managing private resources through special needs trust will be our focus today




What is a Special Needs Trust?

A special needs trust is a legal vehicle that manages funds for the benefit of a person who needs some assistance in daily living.





Why a Special Needs Trust?



- Public benefits (e.g. Medicaid and Supplemental Security Income) have income or asset limits.
- A special needs trust is drafted to protect the person's eligibility to receive public benefits.
- Purchase goods and services not covered by SSI and the Medicaid program in the individual's state.



Third-Party Trust

 A third-party trust is a trust established privately by someone other than the beneficiary (e.g. a parent or grandparent)



First Party or Self-Settled Trust

- A first party or self-settled trust is one created by and funded with assets of the recipient of public benefits or by a court acting on behalf of such person.
- Also referred to as "Medicaid Payback Trust"
- Medicaid recovery upon death of beneficiary



Pooled Trust

- A "master" or pooled trust is managed by a non-profit organization. Individual accounts are established for each beneficiary.
- Account can be established by the individual, parent, grandparent, legal guardian or a court.





The Ideal Trustee

Advocacy

- Uses discretion in the best interest of the beneficiary
- Must understand public benefits
- Provides advocacy and prevents abuse

Accountability

- Organized
- Carries insurance or bondable

Financial

- Wisely invests and conform to all legal requirements
- Understands tax law

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First Party or Self-Settled Trust

There are many options to consider in creating a special needs trust to meet the needs of different families:

- Trust directed by a Trust Advisory Committee
- Trust directed by a Trust Protector
- Use of Care Managers
- Limited purpose trust



Funding the Special Needs Trust

- There are many variables to consider
 - Changes in benefits
 - Changes in services
 - Changes in conditions
 - Changes in your economic situation



Managing Gifts

 Consider asking others to direct gifts to the special needs trust





What is the Special Needs Alliance?

- Provide information about legal and estate planning for persons with disabilities.




